Buttons, bronze, metal. To be of dull-iinished bronze metal, well lacquered, and of permanent finish, circular and slightiy convex in shape, with the monogram letters "شAC" clearly stamped thereon in relief against a lined background. The large buttons about $7 / 8$ of an inch. in diameter, and the small buttons aoout $5 / 8$ of an inch in diameter.
Cap, olive drab, woolen. To be of 13 ounce olive drab woolen material. The crown $10 \frac{1}{3}$ inches from front to rear, and $9 \frac{1}{z}$ from side to side, depending on the size of the cap. To be stiffened in front by means of a hair-cloth spring sewed between the quarters, and falling to the rear without stiffening.
Badge. To be the monogram letters "Mac" and made of dull inished bronze metal, 2 inches nigh and $1 \frac{3}{4}$ inches wide, and to be fitted to the cap and held firmly in place by a screw, washer and nut.
