4. Secretary Halladay presented a letter from Mr. G. C. White, Superintendent of Okemos Consolidated School regarding taxes on College-owned lands in that district.

5. The Secretary reported Mr. McCarthy's proposal concerning a plan to complete two offices in the Union Memorial Building for the use of student publications.

"Resolved, that we petition the State Board of Agriculture to remove the Fractice House and the Music House in the immediate vicinity of the Union Memorial Building in order that the view thereof may not longer be obstructed and marred thereby and in order to complete the landscape work around the building.

"Resolved, that we renew our petition to the State Board of Agriculture of a year ago to remove the foundations of Old College Hall at the earliest opportunity and also renew our earnest request of a year ago that the River Drive be always maintained. "Resolved, that we congratulate the State Board of Agriculture and the College upon the completion of the new Horticulture Building and the many advantages and benefits to result therefrom." 13. The Secretary presented a request from Miss Yakeley that the Board approve at this time such candidates for graduation as may complete their work at the close of this summer Session.

On motion of Mrs. Stockman, it was voted that the proper degrees be awarded all those members of the Summer Session who satisfactorily complete the requirements for graduation and are recommended by the faculty.
