MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE STATE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE, SEPT. 16, 1925.

The meeting was called to order at 11 A. M. in the President's Office.

Present: President Butterfield, Mrs. Stockman, Messrs. Watkins, McColl, McPherson, Gowdy, Brody and Secretary Halladay.

1. It was voted that the minutes of the meeting of July 29 be confirmed.

II. REPORTS FROM PRESIDENT AND SECRETARY FOR RECORD OR INFORMATION.

Confirmation of minutes of Board meeting at Chatham.

1. The President reported the minutes of the meeting of the Board at Chatham on August 15, with no quorum present, and asked for formal confirmation of the record of the actions of that meeting.

REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES OF THE BOARD.

MISCELLAMEOUS BUSINESS FROM PRESIDENT, SECRETARY, DEANS, ETC. VII.

1. The President suggested the desirability of electing at this meeting delegates to the meeting of the Association of Land-Grant Colleges, in Chicago, Nov. 17-19.

On motion of Mr. McColl it was voted that Mr. McPherson, Mr. Watkins, President Butterfield, Deans Phelan, Shaw, Bissell, Krueger, and Director Baldwin be named delegates to the meeting of the Association of Land-Grant Colleges.

2. The President raised the question of the delegate from the State Board of Agriculture to the Association of Governing Boards of State Universities and Allied Institutions.

On motion of Mr. Brody it was voted that Mr. Watkins be the delegate of the Board.

3. The President reported a letter from Mr. John M. Bush, Land Agent of the Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Co., relative to the possibility of the College taking over a farm in Alger County owned by the Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Co.

On motion of Mr. Brody it was voted that the President reply to Mr. Bush regarding the farm which he offered the College.

4. The President reported a recommendation from Dr. McCool and Dean Shaw relative to a leave of absence of L. C. Wheeting and the appointment of Mr. Gordon Schlubatis to carry on Mr. Wheeting's work for one year at a salary of \$1600.

On motion of Mr. McColl it was voted that Mr. Wheeting be given a leave of absence and that Mr. Gordon Schlubatis be appointed to take up the work for one year, Mr. Wheeting to receive half may, \$1400, for the year.

5. The President reported the appointment of Miss Grace Pierce as Instructor in English and History at the Menominee County School to take the place of Miss Hopkins, resigned, at of Miss Hopkins a salary of \$1800 for a period of ten months' services.

On motion of Mr. Gowdy it was voted that the appointment be made.

6. The President read a letter from Dean Shaw submitting information from Mr. Karl Knaus concerning the boiler at the Menominee School.

On motion of Mr. Brody it was voted that the repairs to the Menominee School boiler be authorized.

7. President Butterfield reported a recommendation from Professor Gardner and Dean Shaw relative to sending Dr. Partridge to visit the experimental vineyards in New York.

On motion of Mrs. Stockman the request was granted.

8. President Butterfield reported a recommendation from Dean Shaw relative to a delegate to participate in a field trip relative to the corm borer.

On motion of Mr. Brody it was voted that Professor Pettit be elected the delegate.

9. Secretary Halladay presented a statement from the Hicks Company relative to lightning rods on the Hospital Building.

On motion of Mr. McColl it was voted that lightning rods be installed on the Hospital Building.

10. Secretary Halladay presented a statement from the Potter Manufacturing Corporation relative to payment for fire escape.

VIII. SPECIAL ORDER OF BUSINESS.

Handling of Budget for current maintenance for 1925-26% summary of budget for same year.

- 1. The President read a communication concerning the proposed method of handling the budget for current maintenance for 1925-26 together with a summary of the entire budget for the same year.
- a. Charge all repairs, all minor improvements and all major equipment to special legislatlative appropriations and reduce expenditures for these items to lowest possible terms.
- b. Budget current maintenance on the basis of arbitrary figures to be made by the President and reducing costs to as low terms as possible.
- c. Request departments to make no purchases of minor equipment not absolutely essential to current projects.
- d. Request Dean Shaw to present minimum budgets for experiment station and extension service for the fiscal year.
 - e. Employ a cost accountant for the period of six months beginning October 1st.

On motion of Mr. Brody it was voted that the budget as presented to the Board by the President be adopted.

Mr. Wilkins employed as cost accountant.

2. President Butterfield recommended the employment of Mr. C. 10. Wilkins placed as cost accountant for the period, October 1 to March 31; salary \$400 a month, services to be rendered substantially those outlined in the memorandum which the President read.

On motion of Mr. Brody it was voted that Mr. Wilkins be employed as cost accountant and at the salary named in the request.
