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<u>Abortion</u> is one of those instances in which the law attempts to act as conserver of morality and ends up labeling as crime an act whose <u>only victim</u> of the <u>crime</u> is <u>oneself</u>.

Currently, some legislators in Lansing are attempting to alter this inequity. Soon, the <u>Michigan Congress</u> will again be confronted with the question of the <u>legality of</u> <u>abortions</u>. What is the present law and what are the proposed changes? The following are excerpts from Michigan <u>Senator Lorraine Beebe</u>'s November 12, 1969, speech on <u>Abor</u>tion Law Reform:

Illegal abortion is the highest cause of maternal death . . . Estimates run from 8,000 to 10,000 deaths per year due to complications of illegal abortions in this country . . . Today, Michigan law allows an abortion only when its performance is accessary to preserve the woman's life. The Michigan abortion law was adopted in 1346--seventy-four years before women had the right to vote.

There were 25,330 cases of forcible rape or attacks in 1966 . . . There are five deaths per 100,000 for abortions performed in hospitals compared to seventeen deaths per 100,000 for tonsillectomies, so abortion is far sofer than having a common tonsillectomy . . . The bills before the Michigan legislature . . . recognize human values and human lives and accord them some consideration under the law . . . The proposed changes are entirely voluntary and permissive . . . Freedom of choice is left intact.

What are the pending bills concerning abortion law?

<u>Bill 237</u> - <u>Senator Bursley of Ann Arbor</u> - The bill would allow for therapeutic abortions in licensed and accredited hospitals under any of the following conditions: 1) danger to the mental or physical health of the mother; 2) a serious risk of mental or physical defects in the fetus; 3) in cases of rape or incest. The decision to perform an abortion would have to be approved by three doctors, one of whom would have to be a psychiatrist. No doctor or hospital would be <u>re</u>guired to perform an abortion. Bill 288 - Senator J.E. McCauley of Wyandotte - The bill would make the question of abortion solely a decision of the physician and his patient.

Bill 374 - Senator McCauley - A licensed doctor would be exempt from the criminal code which now states that performing an abortion is either a felony or manslaughter.

What can you do?

Considering these statistics and the existing abortion law, four MSU RA's in Justin Merrill felt that something should be done: Jill Hart, Harper Loods senior, Betty Julian, Detroit senior, Aloha Ruddy, Garden City senior, and Candy Simone, Iron Mountain senior, were influenced by a pamphlet on the subject of abortion created by coads at Boston University. They now plan to publish and distribute a similar pamphlet have early next term. The pamphlet will be divided into three separate topic areas: the first topic will concern birth control (the different types, their effectiveness and accessibility); the second topic will be pregnancy (the symptoms, the alternatives to be considered in deciding to continue or terminate the pregnancy, and where to get help); and the third topic will be venereal disease (its causes, symptoms, consequences and where to go for treatment). The pamphlet will be free and will be distributed both on and off campus.

WIC PUSHES FOR GUEST POLICY REVISION

<u>WIC</u> (Momen's Interresidential Council) recently initiated a revision of the residence hall guest policy, to permit both men and women to have the option of having <u>male/female guests in their rooms after closing hours seven days a week</u>. The present policy is restricted to women guests in men's rooms on Friday and Saturday nights. Men also have the option of requesting a 24-hour open house, whereas women are denied this option. The bill was passed in the residence halls last week and will go to ASMSU, February 24. WIC hopes that this new policy will be in effect by the beginning of spring term.
