

# Walter Sisulu - A Brief Biography

## Architect of the Liberation Movement

It is not widely known that Sisulu's mother Alice Sisulu was a domestic worker and his father, Victor Dickenson, was a white civil servant.

Born on May 18 1912, Sisulu and his elder sister Rosabella were brought up in Ngcobo, Transkei, by his mother, his uncle Dyantyi Hlakula and his grandparents. Sisulu learned a great deal about Xhosa culture and the laws of society from his influential uncle, who was the headman of the village and a lay preacher.

At 14 Sisulu left mission school to work. Between 1928 and 1940 he held many jobs: as a delivery man for a dairy; in the masonry and carpentry department, then as a miner, of the Rose Deep Mine in Germiston; as a domestic; as a baker for Premier Biscuits; as a paint mixer for Herbert Evans in Johannesburg; as a packer for a tobacconist; as a part-time teller at the Union Bank of South Africa, and after 1938 as an advertising salesperson and real estate agent.

He joined the African National Congress in 1940, using his organizing drive to work for the founding of the African National Congress Youth Leagues, which, sought to broaden the base of the ANC and to engage young men and women in political action. Youth League links led to his attending conferences of the Federation of Democratic Youth in Romania and the International Union of Students in Poland. He also traveled to the USSR, China and the UK. He became ANCYL secretary. He published a book on African nationalism commissioned by the government of India in 1954. In the '50s and early '60s he also wrote numerous articles for New Age, the Guardian and Liberation. He developed close friendship and working ties with Nelson Mandela, was elected Secretary-General of the African National Congress in 1949 and played a central role in major campaigns such as the Defiance of Unjust Laws in the '50's.

His vital role was recognized by the apartheid state, which sentenced him to life imprisonment along with other Rivonia trialists in 1963. He spent 26 years in jail, much of that time on Robben Island. He used his time to deepen his links with many fellow freedom fighters and also completed a BA in history and anthropology.

Sisulu's wife is Albertina Thetiwa Sisulu and also a political activist. They have five natural children who have all contributed to the South African struggle: Max, Anthony Mlungisi, Zwelakhe, Lindiwe and Nonkululeko. In addition they have four adopted children: Jonqumzi, Gerald and Beryl (whose biological mothers are Sisulu's sister and his cousin) and finally Samuel, a former Robben Islander who begged to be part of Sisulu's family and has now been formally adopted.

Sisulu was released from prison on 15 October 1989. He was elected Deputy President at the ANC national conference in July 1991 but did not accept a post in

the first democratically elected government in 1994, continuing to work within the ANC.

He became a patron of the UDF, the Omhle Trust and the Twa Twa Trust, and an honorary chancellor of the University of Venda. He holds four honorary doctorate degrees.

He has been awarded the Isitwalandwe by the ANC on the 80th Anniversary of the ANC, Bloemfontein on 8 January 1992.

# Speakers

## David Dinkins

The 106<sup>th</sup> Mayor of the City of New York. He is Professor at in the Practice of Public Affairs at the Columbia University School of International and Public Affairs. He also serves as a Senior Fellow at the Barnard-Columbia Center for Leadership in Urban Public Policy.

## Danny Glover

In 1993 Glover starred as a police officer in the powerful drama "*Bopha!*," based on the life stories of children of black South African police. The film also starred Alfred Woodard, and Malcom McDowell, and was executive produced by Arsenio Hall and directed by Morgan Freeman.

## George Houser

An activist in the U.S. civil rights struggle, George Houser participated with James Farmer in the formation of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) in 1942 and was appointed its first Executive Director. Learning about the planned ANC Defiance of Unjust Laws Campaign he began to mobilize support in the U.S. and after a 1954 visit to South Africa during which he established close ties with many anti-apartheid leaders he left CORE to become the first Executive Director of the newly formed American Committee on Africa (ACOA). ACOA sought to build U.S. support for the growing African struggle to end colonialism and white supremacy, and campaigned to end all U.S economic and political support for apartheid. More than thirty years later, he returned to South Africa to begin, with Herb Shore, a long series of interviews with Walter Sisulu, to put on record an oral history of the life of this giant of the freedom movement This history has been published in South Africa under the title "I Will Go Singing."

## Amb Dumisani Kumalo

Dumisani Shadrack Kumalo has served as South Africa's Ambassador to the United Nations since April 1999. While in exile, he was attached to the African National Congress Mission to the United Nations where he was responsible for supporting the work of the Special Committee Against Apartheid. As Projects Director of the American Committee on Africa/Africa Fund, he played a key role in the U.S. divestment movement which led 26 states, 24 counties and more than 90 cities to divest from U.S. banks and companies which were doing business with apartheid South Africa.

## Ms Cicely Tyson

One of America's most respected dramatic actresses, **Cicely Tyson** has worked steadily as a television, film, and stage actress since making her stage debut in a Harlem YMCA production of **Dark of the Moon** in the 1950s. The daughter of Caribbean immigrants, **Tyson** was raised in Harlem. After working as a secretary

and a successful model, she became an actress, landed her first jobs in off-Broadway productions, and eventually made it to Broadway in the late '50s.
