

I. DR. HASTINGS K. BANDA, April 13 to 20, 1960

New York City: Press conference at Idlewild Airport and ACOA offices; major speech at Africa Freedom Day in Town Hall; informal reception at Donald Harrington apartment; Conference with Ralph Bunche and Dag Hammarskjold at the U.N.; conference with Sir Andrew Cohen; filming of "Today" at NBC; address to Asian-African group at the U.N.; luncheon with businessmen with interests in Africa at New School; reception and talk at U.N. correspondent's Association at U.N.; attendance at Africa Freedom Day reception by independent African states at U.N.; guest of honor at reception given by ACOA at Carnegie International Center; meeting with executives of Ford Foundation; meeting with Adlai Stevenson and executives of Field Foundation; interview with Stewart Meehan of the American Friends Service Committee; luncheon with executives of Time-Life magazines; interviews with Israeli representative.

Toronto: Appearance before coast-to-coast TV program for CBC; interview by Toronto papers.

Washington: Speech before National Press Club preceded by reception; interview with Joseph Satterthwaite, Undersecretary of State for Africa, Department of State; interview at offices of "U.S. News & World Report;" interview by Edward B. II. MR. KENNETH KAUNDA, April 11 to May 14, 1960

Arrived in U.S.A. several days late, but in time for Barry Gray Show, New Paltz Teachers College, and joint press conference with Dr. Banda before Africa Freedom Day celebration. In Washington, D. C. he visited the State Department, UAW, AFL-CIO (George Meany), talked at an Africa Freedom Day meeting sponsored by African-American Institute, and was guest of honor at a reception in Africa House sponsored by African-American Institute. Later in his tour he returned to Washington and saw Vice-President Nixon, Congressman Bowles, labor officials, etc.

Leadership Conference at Nashville; Southern Christian Leadership Conference at Atlanta and guest of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.; Claflin College at Orangeburg, South Carolina; Wake Forest College; Steelworkers Union in Pittsburgh; American Friends Service Committee in Philadelphia; Boston University African Studies Program.
