

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Collectively prepared by the Africa Research Group, this primer is an introductory overview of the situation in Africa today. Popularly written and illustrated, it pinpoints the role imperialism plays in oppressing the African people and surveys their efforts to overcome its stranglehold. The primer features discussions of colonialism, the struggle for independence, liberation movements, neo-colonialism, development problems, and attempts to build socialism.
