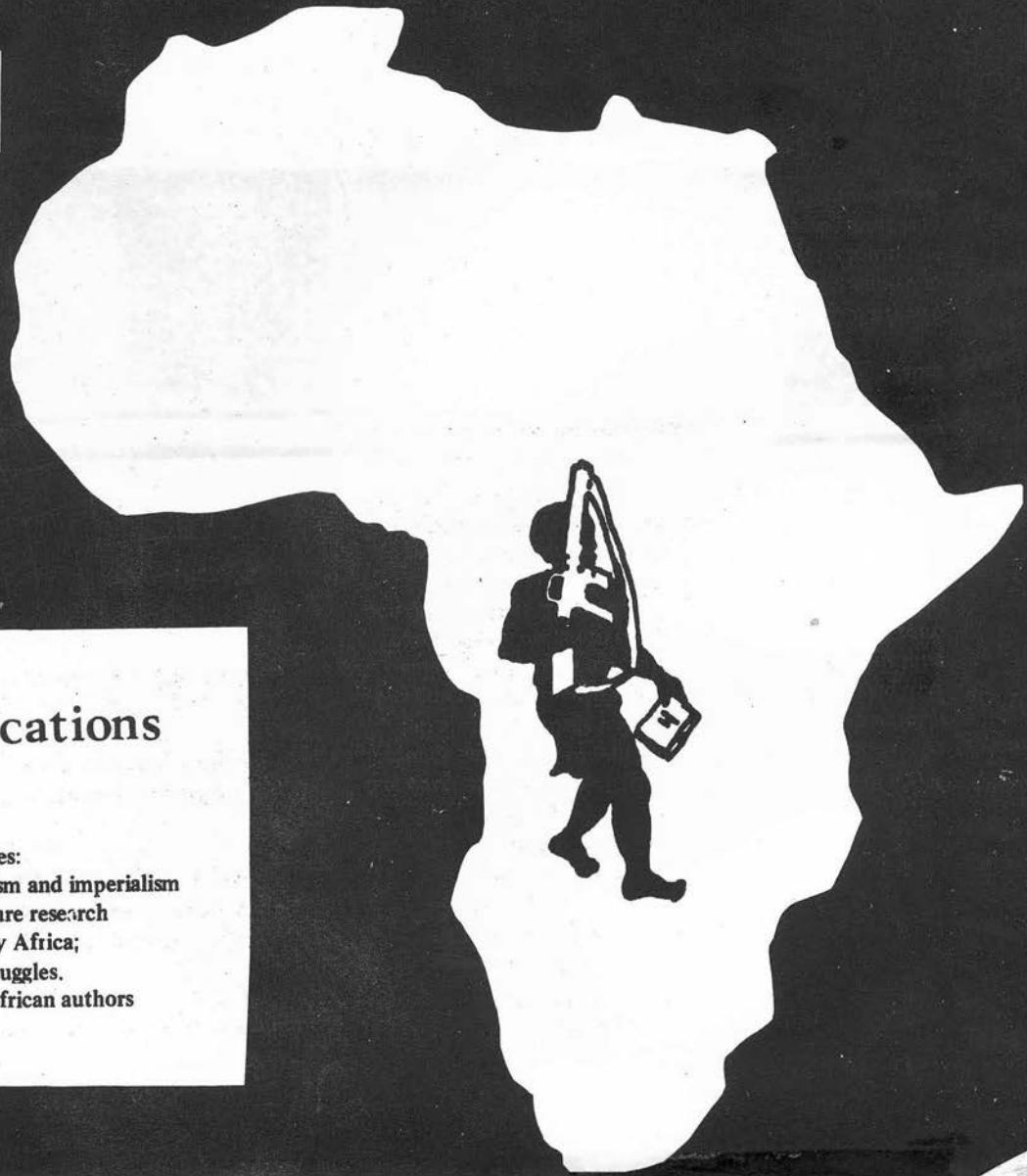

NEO-COLONIALISM AND IMPERIALISM: ORIGINAL STUDIES

1. INSTITUTIONS AND POLICY

- a. African Studies in America - The Extended Family 50c
A "tribal" analysis and critique of U.S. African scholars: who they are and why to fight them. revised edition available fall 1970.
- b. The CIA in Africa 25c
Originally this was published by Ramparts as "The CIA as an Equal Opportunity Employer". More than an expose, it offers an analysis of why the super-secret CIA decided to back certain independence movements and cultural nationalism in Africa.
- c. International Dependency: How America Underdevelops the World 1.00
An original sixty page study of imperialism's strategies in the seventies. A major discussion of new forms of foreign aid, such as multi-lateralism, and how they serve to advance the interests of US corporations at the expense of the world's people. Chapters highlight the role of the U.N., the World Bank and the "Green Revolution".
- d. David and Goliath Collaborate in Africa 25c
A study of how the U.S. and Israel work together to build neo-colonialism.



II. RESEARCH

- a. Radical Study Guide to Africa 50c
The only radical annotated bibliography of its kind. It lists the best books and articles about imperialism and revolution in Africa. It has listings on most regions in Africa, imperialism, African history and radical analyses. It also tells you how you can get the literature published by the guerilla movements.
- b. Research Methodology Guide 1.00
NACLA and ARG. An updated and greatly expanded manual with a section prepared by ARG on researching imperialism and the Third World.
- c. The University-Military Complex 1.00
A comprehensive breakdown of the links between American universities and the Military-Industrial Complex. It lists defense contracts and names the war researchers. Just revised and updated.
- d. How Harvard Rules 1.00
Published in collaboration with the Old Mole. A detailed and analytic study of Harvard University and its services to imperialism. It includes revealing documents liberated by students during Harvard's 1969 strike. Widely considered among the best of the university power studies.
- e. Go to School, Learn to Rule: The Yale Method 25c
An analysis of Yale University prepared in support of the Black Panther Party Defense Rally, New Haven, May Day, 1970.

III. CONTEMPORARY AFRICA --LIBERATION STRUGGLES

- a. Southern Africa 25c
A pamphlet on the problems of the people of Southern Africa and their revolutionary struggle to solve them. Popularly written and illustrated, this pamphlet is intended for widespread high school, college and community distribution.
- b. The Other Side of Nigeria's Civil War 50c
A series of original articles about the Nigerian-Biafran war which presents a class-based analysis of its origins and implications. It argues that imperialism helped structure the conflict and pinpoints the American role. A second article shows how the relief effort served to block political understanding about the conflict and was itself highly political.
- c. Tale of a Guerilla Fighter 10c
A smuggled description of the process of armed struggle in Southern Africa. From Ramparts.
- d. Armed Struggle in Southern Africa 20c
A collection of interviews with leaders of liberation movements.
- e. Ethiopia: Study of Repression 10c
Prepared by the Ethiopian Student Association.



IV. ARG REPRINT SERIES -- AFRICAN AUTHORS

- a. The Struggle in Guinea 25c
by Amilcar Cabral
This speech by one of Africa's foremost revolutionary intellectuals and leader of its most advanced liberation movement, the PAIGC of "portuguese Guine" offers a clear statement of the need for revolution as well as a prophetic glimpse into the problems of neo-colonialism.
- b. Class Struggle in Africa 25c
by Samir Amin
One of the best introductory essays on class relations in Africa. Amin, an Egyptian scholar, surveys the development of classes from traditional village economies to the current neo-colonial formations.
- c. The Powers Behind Apartheid 25c
by G. Fasulo
Fasulo's article from the now defunct magazine Revolution examines the alignment of economic and political forces of the development of South African fascism. Though dated, this pamphlet offers a sound economic and historical background to the political economy of South Africa.

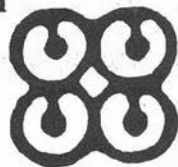

The AFRICA RESEARCH GROUP is a radical research and educational organization committed to promoting a more informed concern with, and protest against, the role the U.S. plays in the domination of Africa. By developing and publishing research about Africa, the ARG seeks to illustrate the international dimensions of racism and the need for fusing an anti-imperialist struggle with an anti-racist one.

Towards this end, the ARG publishes a column of news and analysis which is carried in the Liberation News Service, and distributed in the radical underground press and in black community newspapers, as well as in other publications in the U.S., Europe and Africa. Based in Cambridge, Mass., the ARG has several members working in other cities and maintains representatives in Africa and Europe.

The ARG has a very modest budget. It is financed by individual contributions, occasional grants from churches and other sympathetic organizations. It receives no support from government agencies, U.S. corporations or their foundations. We welcome your help.
